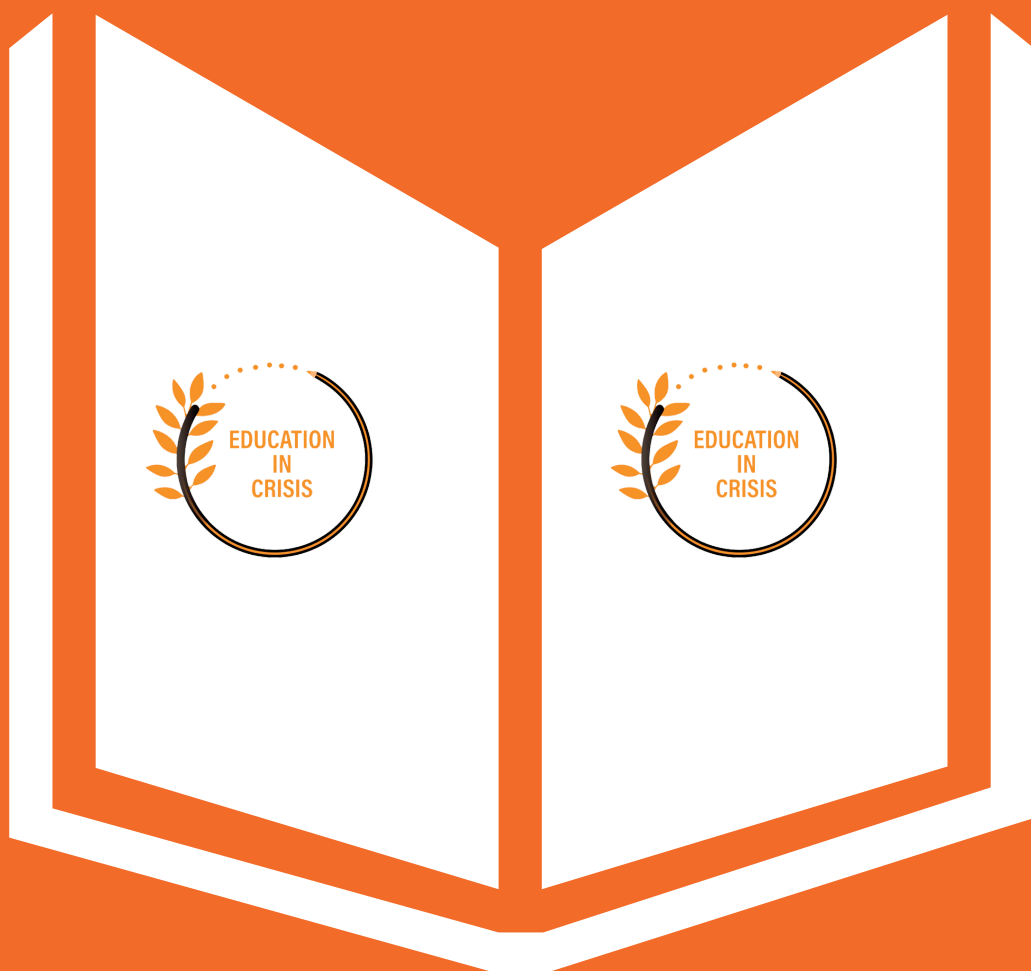


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Our world like never before from the onset of 2020, has never been the same again. From the outbreak of Covid-19 to different humanitarian catastrophes we have seen in recent years.

Like any other organization, branding is key to organizational existence and because of that, the members of EIC in November 2021 made a public announcement to inform our partners and stakeholders about our rebranding decision.

With a similar brand name, our fear was that our future brand identification would be put in jeopardy and so it was necessary for us to take action immediately to rebrand from **Blossoms of the Nubian Savannah** (BONS) to **Education in Crisis** (EIC) in January 2022.

INTRODUCTION

Learn about our new name and identity

Education in Crisis (EIC) with a new logo became our official name after successfully changing it with the SRRRA in the Nuba Mountains where we were registered legally. Adopting the new name and restructuring the organization's vision and mission so that every child whose education is in crisis gets an equal opportunity to get access to inclusive and quality education.

We now aim at influencing grassroots support from private, public, and high net-worth individuals to invest in education for all, advocate for the implementation of gender equality, disability and inclusion in education, climate education, and psychological support to facilitate smooth learning while strengthening teachers and safety of learning environments.

The co-founders agreed to legally register EIC and place its headquarters in Arusha – Tanzania, because of Sudan's political unrests that cannot promote the smooth running of an NGO like EIC if it has to keep up with global donors, partners, individuals willing to invest into quality education for all and so started the application process to obtain a certificate of operation as a national non-governmental organization.

From our humble start of an impact journey, EIC has been led by resilient and committed volunteers, bringing together small resources in kindness to influence even one life. This is why EIC owes the biggest gratitude to its members and donors.

As the year comes to an end, we are celebrating the commitment and resiliency of those members, it has shown to us and even to the stakeholders the capability, ambitiousness, and reliability of such young but wanting to help their people come out of illiteracy and poverty bondages through educational tooling.

Now is the time we stood up to advocate and champion the right to education for all everywhere around the world through supporting our young people's education.

It is time for every **politician** and **policy-maker** to rethink the financing of education for every vulnerable youth and child.

We thank everyone for supporting EIC's mission of promoting inclusive, equitable, quality education for poverty alleviation and sustainable development.

We also invite individuals, organizations both national and international to join us on calling on the world leaders to prioritize the [Right To Education](#) for all in 2023 and beyond.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The [African Union's 2063 agenda](#) and the United Nations [sustainable development goals 2030](#) set the stage for the humanitarian ecosystem to chart a new path forward to ensure that education creates safe, protective environments that promote the well-being and healthy development of all girls, boys, and adolescents via relevant, quality, holistic education.

And yet, over the years, EIC through partners and our direct work with school and non-school children, has noted with great concern some chronic hindrances that are keeping them from unlocking their untapped potentials.

Among them include feeling unworthy, deterioration in learning, and unfriendly childhood experiences, among others which have left some traces in their mental and physical health thus influencing their perceived self-worth, ability to trust others or themselves which come from dysfunctional families, unhealthy relations.

For children to navigate through their life's dreams, we must invest in their full mental stability as well as the adults or people who are involved in their upbringing. While this requires time, commitment, and radical support, it requires resources and expertise to bring together professionals and reach even the hard-to-reach children and individuals living in such situations.

To be able to fully learn, children and adolescents face immense adversity and stress from limited or no basic needs to meeting the needs of the whole being. Education, not only offers protection and health while they are in school but ensures that their mental health and well-being are protected and promoted while busy learning.

This and many other barriers to education accessibility in Africa that only have worsened education crises should and must be prioritized by any means. It is for this reason that, we are mobilizing every effort from local to international levels, individual to groups, and private to public sectors to partner with us in investing in inclusive, equitable, quality education for all in 2023.

Denying them an opportunity to chase after their dreams and achieve their full life's potential is the greatest mistake by any society, individual, or government. By going to school, children and youth can learn the skills that are needed for their survival workplaces, and coexistence with the global people. This means they're more likely to get a job in the future, earn an income, and support a family and their lives which in the long run, benefits the community, country, and the world in which they live; having a more skilled workforce drives economic growth as educated workers are paid more and work more efficiently.

Message from Executives

As COVID-19 continued, the world grappled with the fallout of overlapping crises, climate change, and price instability. The year 2022 will be remembered as a period of significant global education crises as millions of children continued to drop out of school due to overwhelming education crises.

Extremely poor and vulnerable people continue to be the most severely impacted. As governments consider viable options to address extreme poverty, the scale-up of economic inclusion programs is as critical as ever.

The journey of development since our humble beginning in 2020 is almost unbelievable. In 2021 we started with 4 children in a single school whom we now support to finish primary school education.

In 2022, we added more 6 children in the Nuba Mountains, one in Tanzania, one in South Sudan, and three in Uganda, making a total of 15. These were fully sponsored children.

Although we are proud to share our achievements, more still is required to transform education in Africa. As EIC continues to grow, new realities emerge. Moving into 2023, together with our members and donors, we will need to accelerate efforts for education recovery, with empowerment as a key focus.

To generate an income to help cover the needs of families, lower levels of formal education must be prioritized.

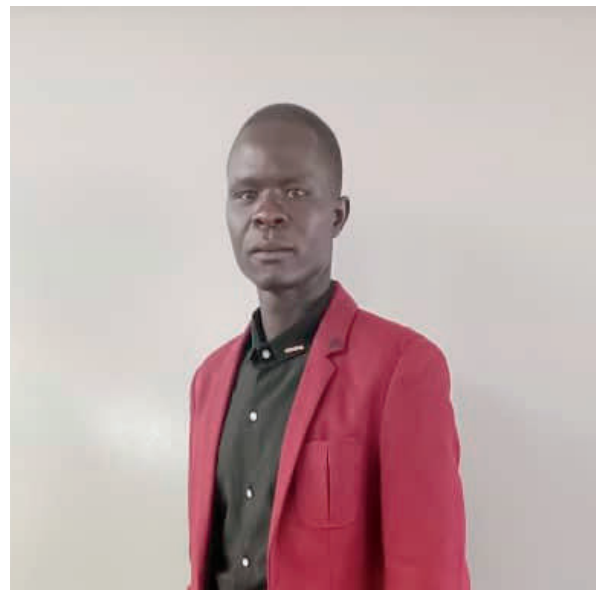

OUR FOUNDING STORY

From facing challenges accessing university or college education in 2019, George Omer Nalo approached his colleagues at different universities about the idea of giving back to their community in the Nuba Mountains of Sudan. Those that bought the idea were originally about 42 but when they started to monthly contribute equivalent to Uganda Shillings 10,000 (\$3), they were left only two contributing. After registration by SRRA, two school-drop-out girls in the Nuba Mountains became the first to be given scholarship after the school headteacher availed the names and reports of those who dropped out although brilliant due to financial difficulties, so we traced them and brought them back to class.

This is just an example of what \$3 saved for months could do to a vulnerable life of a rural girl in Sudan who wanted to study but her education was in crisis due to inaccessibility.

In 2022, we managed to grow from 2 subscribing members to 7 contributing \$30 monthly from \$3. Our first external donation was received from a friend of George from Arizona in the USA (the two met on Facebook) who donated \$20 in 2021 which was a lot of money by then since it purchased scholastic materials for our two girls since they were lacking them and we didn't have more than tuition fees.

From that time, our new members have transformed more children with their donation of \$30 monthly. We now have 8 fully sponsored and 7 partially sponsored children in secondary education in Uganda, Sudan and Tanzania.

“ We started with the contribution of \$3 per month and were only two by then, so we had to save for the whole year (2020) then registered that same year when we finally saved what was enough to get us registered... ”

Since then, our volunteers have continued to grow in numbers across East Africa who are majorly university students. EIC looks at its major countries of operation that include Tanzania, Sudan, Kenya, South Sudan and Uganda (remotely) therefore, having enjoyed the diversity and inclusiveness in our work as staff and members, we are looking forward to establishing our offices firmly in those countries in 2023.



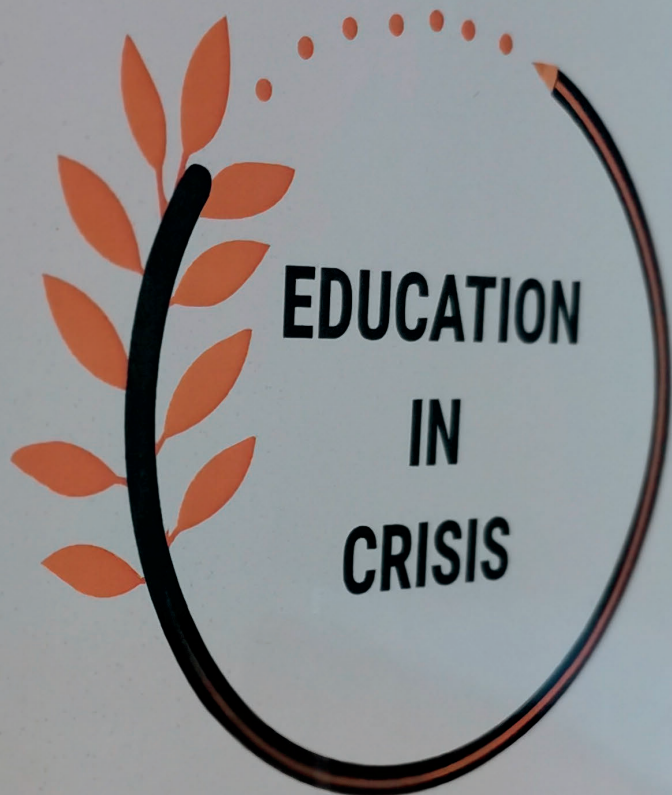
To transform their lives, children and youth must be motivated to own the future that belongs to them through education

Monitoring and evaluation forms the basis for modification of interventions and assessing the quality of activities being conducted.



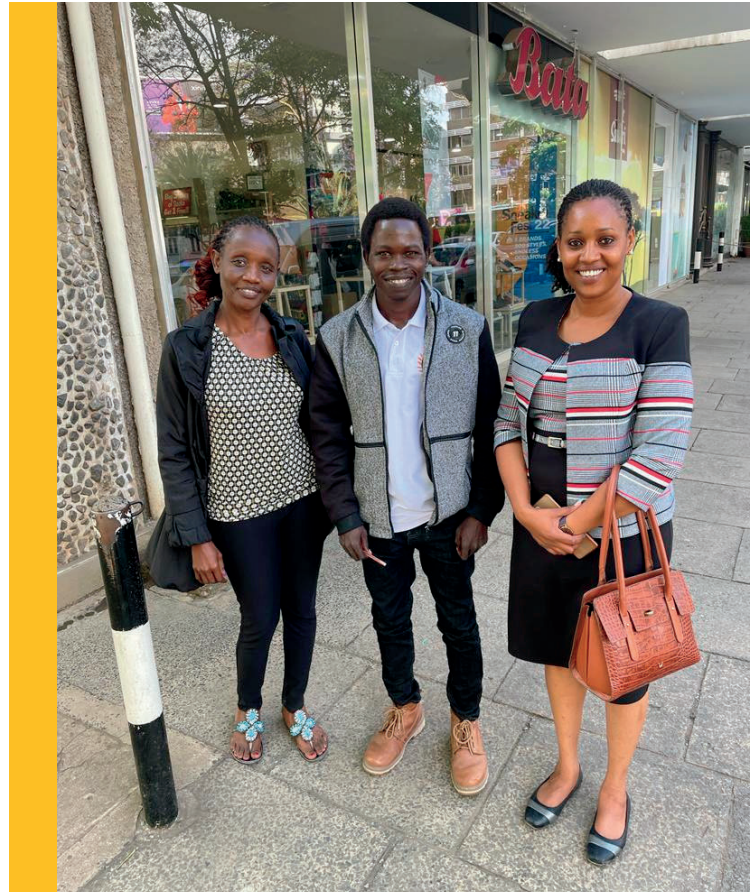


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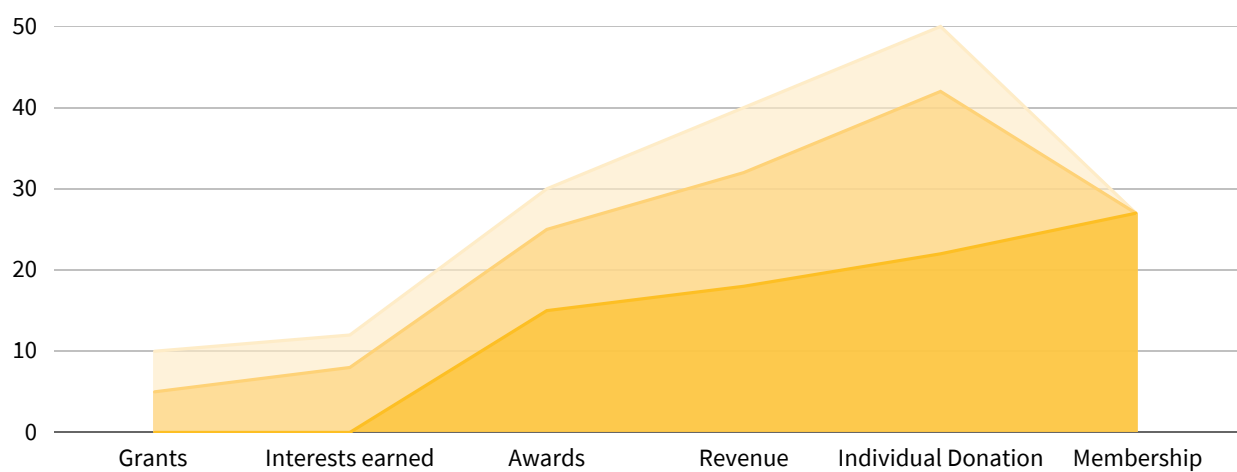

Scope of Financial Reporting

This financial report consists of all the financial statements from the 1st of January to December 31, 2022, and it includes all the financial performance for the year.

This report has been prepared by the provisions of Uganda law, in particular, Act 19 on the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for Non-Profit Organizations for each reporting year. All donations were non-dedicated and therefore freely available for the period considered.

There are no recurring donations (permanent standing orders) to be mentioned, nor any contributions from the public sector or Public Private Partnerships.

This Financial Report 2022 is not certified by an auditor. However, the figures and books were taken into consideration by our internal finance officials and are needed for the year-to-year comparison of the 2021 and 2022 accounts.

Note; *The 2022 financial reporting was done by our finance manager who is based in Uganda but works remotely*



In addition to the financial statements for EDUCATION IN CRISIS, this report also details the operating accounts for our activities in Uganda and provides transparency for the use of funds donated by Membership and individuals to EIC. The reporting currency is USD and UGX.

Objectives

This report is prepared for the following objectives:

1. Present the financial performance of the organization for the last 12 months, of the year-end 2022.
2. Display the income and expenditures incurred for the last 12 months of 2022.



Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ended 31st December 2022

1. Operational Results

The total income for the year 2022 is **\$4,425 USD** which represents **15,930,000** Ugandan Shillings at the exchange rate 3,600 Ugandan Shillings per USD1.00 and the local currency is **2,135,000** which represents **\$593.1 USD**. The account was prepared in both Ugandan Shillings and USD. **10,294,600** Ugandan Shillings which represents **\$2,859.61 USD** (hard currency) and **\$1,001** was the total expenditure for the year 2022. The local currency conversion is same as above. The fund received for the period as income was donations from individuals, foundational donors and revenue from income generating activities.

2. The expenses were distributed as follows 100% of the income was used as expenditure. The Program/projects spent 70%, the administrative expenses were 10% and fundraising expenses made up 20% of expenditure.

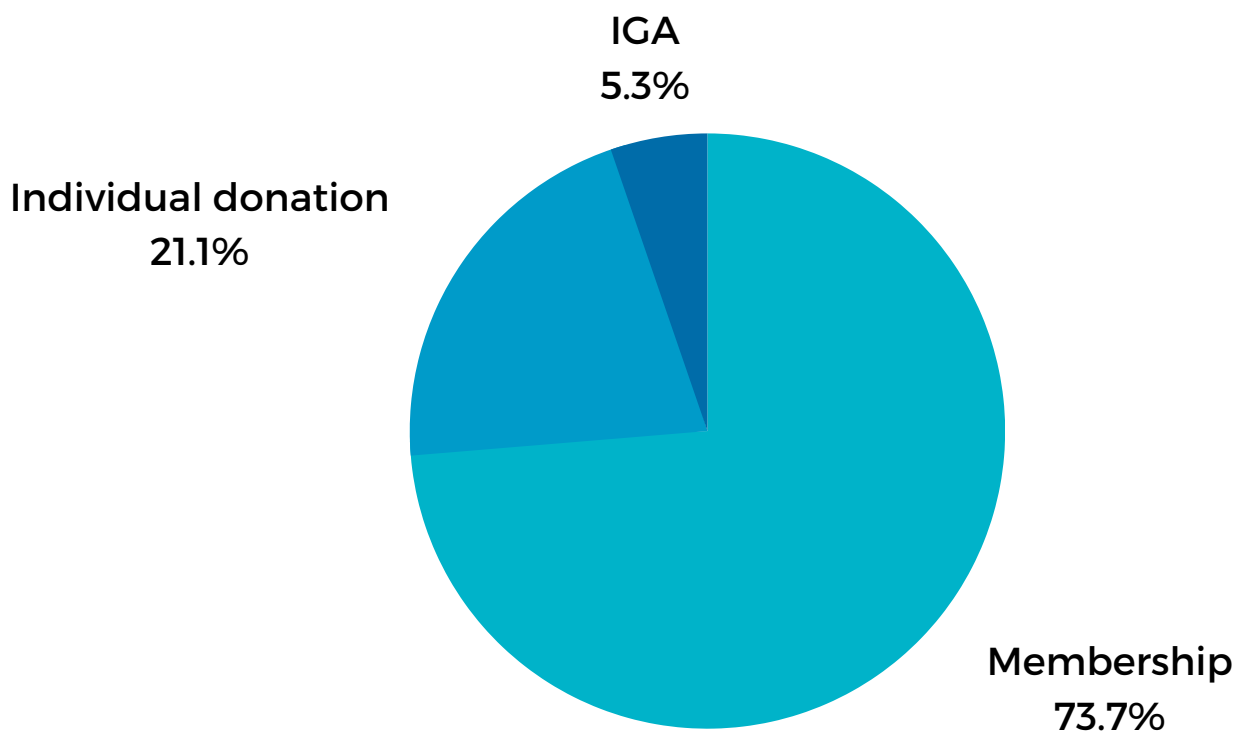

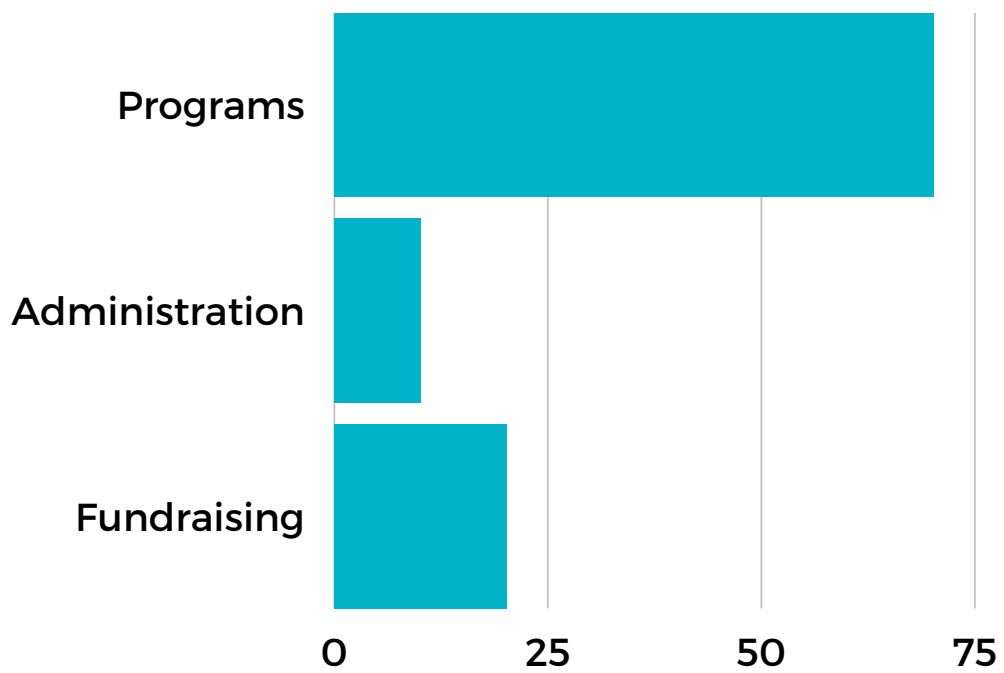

Challenges

NGO Registration: EIC is still not officially registered in Uganda, which has limited our activities.

Funding: The EIC is heavily dependent on the contribution from the membership which is not a good sign for long-term running.

Office space: The EIC still operates remotely as we do not have enough funds for office rent and it is challenging.

What makes Education to be in crisis?

A growing body of evidence suggests the learning crisis is, at its core, a teaching crisis. For students to learn, they need good teachers but many education systems pay little attention to what teachers know, what they do in the classroom, or whether they even show up. While countries have significantly increased access to education, being in school isn't the same thing as learning. Worldwide, hundreds of millions of children reach young adulthood without even the most basic skills like calculating the correct change from a transaction, reading a doctor's instructions, or understanding a bus schedule thus putting education in some serious crisis globally.

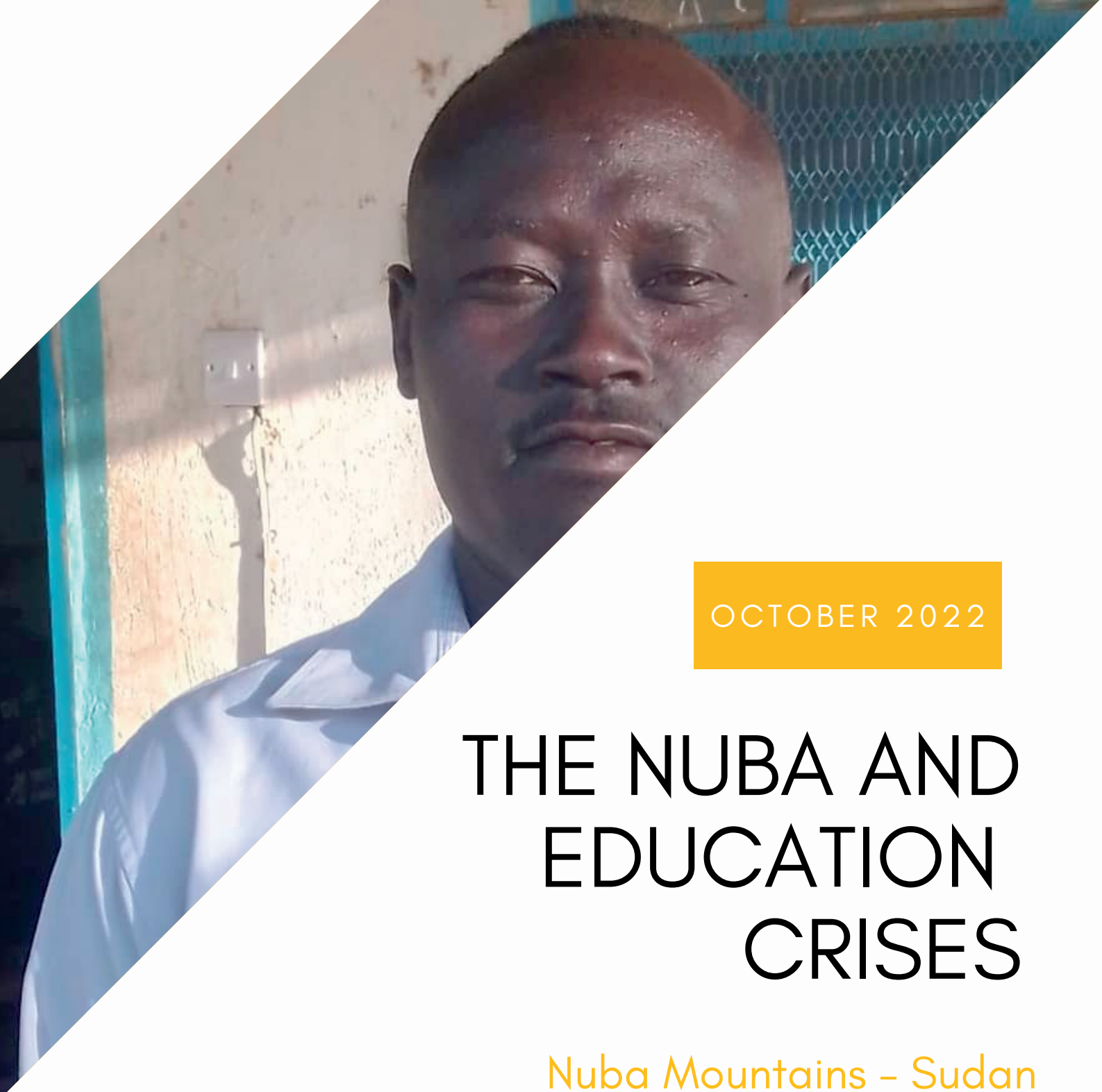

THE NUBA AND EDUCATION CRISES

Nuba Mountains – Sudan

Since the outbreak of civil war that erupted on June 2011 between the Khartoum government and SPLM/N, the situation in the Nuba Mountains and the Blue Nile has continued to deteriorate and become massively worse forcing many to be displaced, loss of lives and destruction of infrastructure such as social amenities which have made people be subjective to starvation to death, hunger, and epidemic diseases. Where people are looking to only have what to eat and drink, education becomes a secondary need.

Unable to access any social services such as clean water, hospitals, schools, and food among other services, vulnerable children's hopes have all been darkened and so desperate to learn, yet education is not a priority due to the economic capabilities of those who take care of them.

EIC has been working hand in hand with the local authority and secretary of education in the identification of the most vulnerable children so that the help gets to the right people who need it most.

As we move into the new year 2023, I would to request each member of EIC and partners to increase any efforts towards resource mobilization for children in the Nuba Mountains and Blue Nile of Sudan whose education for years has not only been marginalized but denied access to by different barriers I have outlined above.

Your support is lifesaving and a forever gift of hope when they are able to be in class once again and pursue their life's dreams like any other child elsewhere in the world. Let us give them that chance by contributing any amount of resources.

Problems worsening Education crises in Sudan

With over three million children in Sudan who do not attend school, the severe gap in the education system continues the cycle of poverty in the country. Chronic underdevelopment and conflict are two of the most significant reasons children in Sudan are out of school.

The Society

Societal additional hurdles such as cultural pressures and traditional views that prevent them from supporting children from receiving an education is also another yet issue pushing education crisis to the brink, awareness is only the key to changing this.

The Environment

From classrooms to homes, there is no assured security to school children in Sudan who miss out attending school due to unsafe environment that does not support smooth learning. This cannot promote smooth learning.

The Pandemics

From temporarily closing educational institutions in order to reduce the spread of COVID-19, approximately 825 million learners were affected due to school closures in response to the pandemic. Ask yourself, how children have returned to classes todate?

My name is Kaka Abdu Mohammed, sometimes I wonder what exactly my people have done to deserve this kind of life. After the war broke out, we were all seeking for safety and not just for ourselves but animals as well. I remember my father went out to look after the animals when the unfortunate befell on him. Two jet fighters appeared from nowhere and the only sound we heard was bombs dropped somewhere far from our home. We didn't panic so much because it was a usual thing for us but after sometimes, someone came running to our home and sadly to break the worst news of the passing of our father by the bombs earlier dropped. This has been one of my greatest pain I ever experienced. I was 8 years old by then.

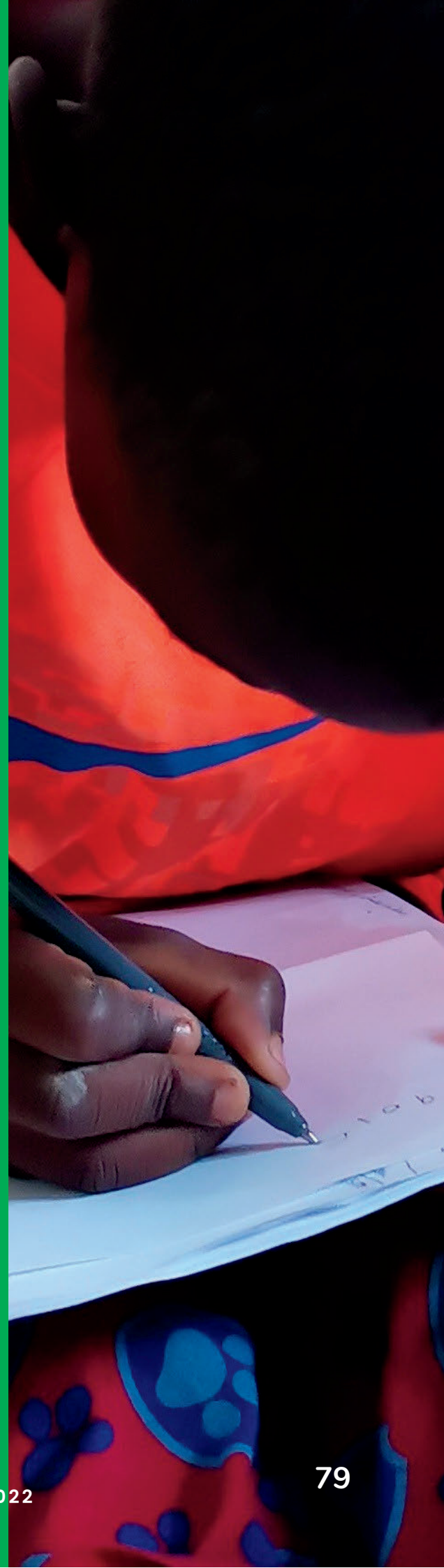

GIRLS' EDUCATION

While gender equality in education benefits every child;

Investing in girls' education transforms communities, countries, and the entire world. Girls who receive an education are less likely to marry young and more likely to lead healthy, productive lives. They earn higher incomes, participate in the decisions that most affect them, and build better futures for themselves and their families.

Girls' education strengthens economies and reduces inequality. It contributes to more stable, resilient societies that give all individuals - including boys and men - the opportunity to fulfill their potential.

But education for girls is about more than access to school. It's also about girls feeling safe in classrooms and supported in the subjects and careers they choose to pursue - including those in which they are often under-represented.

EIC puts girls' education at the heart of every opportunity so that they too can catch up with their counterparts in realizing their dreams.



According to UNICEF, around the world, 129 million girls are out of school, including 32 million of primary school age, 30 million of lower-secondary school age, and 67 million of upper-secondary school age. In countries affected by conflict, girls are more than twice as likely to be out of school than girls living in non-affected countries.

Head office in Tanzania

Complete the registration process of Education in Crisis in the United Republic of Tanzania and as such, we shall establish it as the head office where our main activities and plans originate from before spreading to other liaison offices. This was the strategy set by the founders of EIC considering Tanzania as a strategic location in Africa to advance easily and expand the work of EIC to the rest of the parts.

Liaison office in Kenya

In a bid to focus on bringing together strategic groups into focusing on the right to education for all, EIC initiated African Partnership for Education and started its registration process in Kenya whose head office will be hosted in Nairobi, Kenya.

Liaison office in Sudan

Education in Crisis was first registered in Sudan's Nuba Mountains in 2020 and as such, we have made an office where our main activities are conducted and we plan on building the office premises on the land that was given by the community. We still operate in a shared space in a community building but in the next year 2023, we hope to start building our office. We will need to mobilize some resources to be able to do that.

Registration in South Sudan

In August 2022, the AP4E was officially registered in South Sudan as a national non-governmental organization with head office in the capital, Juba. This means our main activities will be carried out in the Republics of Kenya, Tanzania, South Sudan and Sudan in 2023. While in other countries through partnerships.
